## **Calor award for Painswick**

Representatives from a number of Gloucestershire parishes

recently attended a dinner held to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the founding of the Gloucestershire Rural Community Council (GRCC). The dinner, at which the principal guest was HRH The Princess Royal, was also the occasion for the presentation of the Calor Village of the Year awards. Painswick Parish Councillor, Martin Slinger, who with his wife Mary represented the council at the dinner, told the Beacon that he and the council had been unaware before the event that Painswick had won the "Young Peoples" category. He said that he had been delighted to receive the award because it helped to belie the view held by some people that Painswick was a community dedicated to the elderly.

The overall winner of the Calor Gloucestershire Village of the Year award was Coaley. Other category awards went to North Nibley (Community Life), Dymock (Business), Maismore (Older Residents), Blockley (Environment) and Fairford (Information Technology). The Princess Royal, in her address, spoke of the outstanding contribution made by the

GRCC to Gloucestershire's rural communities since its creation in 1923. She said that the GRCC's role had never been more important than at the present time and she referred to the many areas in which the council was active. One of the areas to which the Princess Royal made mention, of particular relevance to Painswick, was the promotion of Affordable Housing for young people. Princess Anne, who was warmly thanked for her contribution to the celebrations by the GRCC Director, Stephen Wright, commented on the fact that the food and drink provided at the dinner had all come from Gloucestershire producers. Calor were the principal sponsors of the event.

# Painswick Companion Dog Show

# The Charter Week in pictures



The centre pages this month have been set aside to carry pictures of all the main events which took place during the 'Charter' week of celebrations.

We hope that these will be a pleasing reminder of many enjoyable experiences, in addition to those which gave us an insight to the history and valued heritage which is ours to treasure.

Other items this month include **change of ownership** of Painswick Hotel, strong views about **hunting**, a **'stranger' in the stocks**, definition of **quality Parish Councils**, a future for **junipers**, **vandalism** on a farm, **graduation** results, **bus service** withdrawn, the **feasting in Cranham** and a **rocket regarding fireworks**.

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to draw attention to those of wider interest, but remind readers that the full minutes of Council meetings are available at the Council office on Wednesday and Friday mornings, as well as Painswick Library.

#### PLANNING COMMITTEE

A less 'heavy' agenda than usual, but concerns regarding two matters attracted quite a lot of attention.

#### Clattergrove

There was concern expressed that work was, apparently, in hand to remove the roof of old store buildings just off the road from the A46 adjacent to the Clattergrove properties and that the intentions in these works were unknown.

It was agreed to seek guidance from the District Council and the Painswick Manorship across whose land access was obtained.

#### Pathway - Croft School

The footpath adjoining the Croft School playing field, between Butt Green and Churchill Way, was reported as becoming less attractive than once was the case. A wall belonging to a private property had collapsed, mostly into its garden but leaving rubble adjoining the pathway; and the remainder of the wall was reported as none too stable.

It was agreed to write to the owner to ascertain intentions regarding reinstatement, not least on safety grounds.

#### **Parish Plan**

The Planning Committee's elements of Part Two of the Plan have now all been addressed.

## PARISH COUNCIL

#### Public 'question time'

As part of the continuing process of endeavouring to maximise public access to Parish Council affairs, this itself a component of 'quality Parish Council status, the Council meeting will from September be open to public questions at the commence-



ment of proceedings - for the first quarter of an hour.

Written questions which have been lodged with the Clerk at least 24-hours prior to the meeting will be taken, with the questioner having the opportunity to be present and speak to his or her subject.

#### **Council correspondence**

It was noted that, under new systems introduced by the Clerk, all incoming and outgoing correspondence (other than that of a strictly confidential nature) was copied or included in files available to all councillors or members of the public interested in such matters.

#### **Museum - Information Link - Library**

The Council received a verbal report from the Working Party it had set up to examine the proposals (p.5 of February Beacon) which had been advanced for several services to be brought together within the County Council premises, including the library itself. It was noted that (a) the concept of a museum as such was unlikely to be progressed, (b) that accumulation of what might broadly be described as 'heritage' material was seen as highly desirable, and (c) that the future of the library service in these premises was in the balance.

It was agreed to accept the recommendation of the WP to write to the County Council and the Countryside Agency inviting them to come round a table at the earliest practicable date to discuss matters of interest to themselves and to this Council, including the possibility of the creation in these premises of an information/education point for the Cotswold Way National Trail - it being noted that such would conveniently lie at the mid-point of that trail (with existing car parking alongside).

#### **Charter Exhibition**

The Council applauded the remarkable exhibition which had been mounted by the History Society and others who had loaned material during Charter Week, and noted the considerable public interest which had been shown. A letter from the Society was received with an invitation to jointly explore the possibilities of storage of display items and consider the future of such exhibitions. It was agreed that such should be investigated thoroughly and supported if possible. (See also preceding item.)

Cotswold Way signage in Painswick

The Chairman of the Footpath Committee, Alan Shearer, reported that he had met with the National Trail Officer and the Chairman of the Conservation Society to look into the type and location of Trail signs along its route within the village.

Signs will probably be located at the ends of Gloucester Street and from Edge Road, and two additional 'fingers' added to the major sign in Victoria Square.

#### Finger sign - Victoria Square

It was agreed that this sign was needing repainting and this will be put in hand.

Street naming - St.Marys Development
One new cul-de-sac will be formed within
this development and adopted by the County Council, and the developers had invited
the Parish Council (through the District
Council) to consider their proposed name
of 'St. Marys Close' for the carriageway.
It was agreed to set up a small Working
Party to respond to SDC having considered
options.

#### St.Marys Street toilets

The Council gave further consideration to the area within the ladies toilets which was misused and in poor decorative condition. There was also concern that the overall condition and standards of these toilets did not reflect well upon the village. It was agreed to delegate the matter of remedial action to close off the unused area and consider quotations for overall upgrading.

#### **Inconsiderate users of fireworks**

A letter and verbal reports were received regarding the use of seemingly ever increasing firework events, with louder than ever rockets, and indifference regarding the timing of such private occasions. The distress caused to animals, whether on farms, in paddocks or domestic, was highlighted - as was the seeming indifference of users regarding the time of day when these were being set off. One recent event commenced after midnight.

Mention was made of the effect of loud explosions within valleys, and the considerable echo caused - and, hence, impact upon the wider community. It was agreed to ask the Beacon to draw attention to this conduct (which we are, here, pleased to do - and on the letters page) in the hope that prior to legislation greater discretion will be exercised.

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#### **Affordable Housing - Gyde Trustees**

The Council received a long awaited letter from the Gyde Trustees regarding the area of land below the surgery which the Parish and District Council had hoped might be released for the purpose of erection of up to six 'affordable' starter homes for young people.

The Trustees recorded that they felt they were constrained by the professional report/advice they had received regarding the future values of that land and were, therefore, unable to make representations to the Charity Commissioners to release it. They did, however, point out that they were in no way challenging the fact that there was a proven need for such housing to complement the stock of properties in the area for such use.

#### Right to roam

As part of its mapping process the Countryside Agency has been in touch with the Parish Council drawing attention to its duties under the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 to identify new rights to walk on certain types of land for the purposes of outdoor recreation.

A draft map identifying such land is currently open to public consultation and it is regarded as important that opinions are recorded at this stage in order to ensure that land which is common land is itself clearly identified, and private land and form of tenure made clear. The consultation period ends on 30th September this year.

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## **Busses stop**

If readers did not already know, the B1 twice daily bus route **Painswick - Gloucester** has been ended with little notice to anyone. The last bus on this route runs tomorrow, Saturday. The Beacon understands that the extent of use was such that the subsidy could no longer be continued, but we have also received strong condemnation of this action.

We have been told that this was a very important service, even for the few regulars who used it. One reader told the Beacon that she has no other means of transport to Gloucester other than to walk into the village, mostly across fields and along a narrow lane, for the 0925 bus if she should want to visit such as the hospital, to shop in the City, or do other things which are so readily available to car drivers.

We cannot help but note that such a service has a very small number of users and that they are without any strength of voice in making their particular protest at the circumstances in which they now find themselves. We asked the Parish Council if they had received



notice of any closure and, if so, when was this made known to them and whether they were doing anything about the difficulties arising. Terry Parker, Council Chairman, told the Beacon that "The Parish Council was informed about the proposed withdrawal of the B1 bus service to Gloucester in a letter dated 13th June. The County Council has given an assurance that notices giving details of the proposed withdrawal were displayed along the route. The Parish Council's bid for the funding of a Village Link bus was unsuccessful but another bid is being submitted. That bid includes the provision of a service between Painswick and Upton St Leonards where passengers would be able to connect

with the regular service to Gloucester. It is appreciated that, even if the bid is successful, it will be a little while before the service can be introduced. In the meantime the Parish Council continues to be in discussion with the County Council in seeking to provide a service to Gloucester from Painswick that would not involve changing at Brockworth."

One suggestion has come our way, and that is for the County Council, and any other agencies involved, to seriously consider re-routing the 92 and/or the 92A service Gloucester-Brookthorpe-Pitchcombe-Stroud-Tetbury which runs no less than about twelve times a day, or the 93 service Gloucester-Pitchcombe(Church)-Whiteshill-Stroud-Forest Green of which there are a similar number. Could not some be diverted to take in Painswick, from Pichcombe and return there, a few times a day? It would actually be quicker to reach Gloucester by that route than on the B1.

Also, purely by chance, the Beacon was told that the 46 service **Cheltenham - Forest Green**, the main bus connection used from Painswick to such as Cheltenham or Stroud would no longer be running on Sundays. However, we are assured by the GCC Sustainable Transport Unit that this is not the case, and no changes are planned for that service.





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
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## Painswick Blues

# Painswick Show: The end? Or prelude to a new beginning?

It's August, it's Painswick and so we should all be looking forward to the Painswick Show. However, as reported in recent issues of the Beacon, the Painswick Show – at least for this year – has been cancelled, essentially because of doubts raised about how suitable the Painswick Park site is in the light of British Show Jumping Association requirements.

Whilst the current situation seems – at least in part - the result of a series of misunderstandings between the Show Society and Mr and Mrs Elvidge, the current owners of Painswick Park, the continuing exchange may well be masking more important issues. These concern the nature of the Painswick Show and the changing environment in which it operates.

The Show started life in 1946 as a small, one-day, agricultural and horticultural show at Jenkin's Farm, Edge. Over the years, and particularly since moving to Painswick House in the 1970s, the show has grown into a high profile two-day event, with trade stands and a show jumping component that attracted top riders from all over the county and indeed the country. David Broome, Richard Meade, Mark Phillips and The Princess Royal have all competed at the Painswick Show. By the time of its Golden Jubilee in 1995, it was described as 'one of only a few remaining real village country shows'.

Arguably, Painswick Show has been punching above its weight (or, perhaps, jumping above its height) for years. In other words it has been trying to maintain its credibility alongside major county shows, always struggling to achieve the critical mass necessary for a two-day commercially viable event and to maintain the facilities required to reach British Show Jumping Association standards (particularly with regard to health and safety). It has also relied on a small, dedicated band of unpaid organisers to tackle the ever more formidable tasks of administering and managing the show in a professional manner.

So, what of the future? Will there be another Painswick Show? With the recent sad death of Janet Dent, who was largely responsible for the Show's horticultural content and one of the senior committee members, the Show Society has put matters on hold for the time being. The chairman, Bob Rumble explained that that Painswick Show Society would make a statement when it felt it was appropriate and a replacement site had been identified. He remains convinced that Painswick Park is no longer a viable proposition for the Show in its current format. For their part, the Elvidges remain committed to making Painswick Park available for some sort of annual event, which could combine equestrian with other country pursuits.

The point of consensus seems to be that a smaller scale, one-day village fete/gymkhana could be possible at Painswick Park. Perhaps it is time for the Painswick Show to revert to its roots and become once more small but beautiful! Could the planned Companion Dog Show in August, reported in last month's Beacon, provide the future focus for such an event?

## The junipers are coming

A group of children from The Croft School took a walk on Painswick Beacon recently to look at Juniper trees, which have been in steady decline over the years.

Hamish, Rory, Perry, Samantha, Gemma and Kate from year 2, met with Beth Sidaway from English Nature and Cedric Nielson from the Painswick Beacon Conservation Group on 7th July to learn about and ob-



serve some of the few remaining trees. Armed with a camera and paper and pencils for sketching and making notes, we learned that Junipers produce male and female plants.



The female plants were full of berries, green now but turning black when they ripen. The berries can be used to flavour meat dishes, and Gin. The trees were affected by the wind force, and had interesting, lop-sided shapes where they had been blown. We discovered that the leaves are spiky and sharp.

Cuttings of the Juniper trees have been taken to a nursery in Cheltenham. We are hoping to go and see their progress in the Autumn term.

When they have rooted we will look after them at the school until they are mature enough to plant back out on the Beacon.

# Beacon Conservation Group

Last month I reported that we will be holding a demonstratiation how to operate and maintain the new grass cutting machine. The date will be 3rd September and the time 9.30am. Anyone who is interested in attending this hands on event including present members is invited to attend. We will meet at the Walkers car park, Golf Course Road, on the Common. It would be helpful if you could leave a message to say you were coming on 812385.

On the the Juniper Project, some of the pupils from the Croft School with their teacher, Mrs. Sanderson, Beth Sidaway, the National Trust schools liaison officer and myself took them up to see the Junipers growing on the Beacon. It was a fine sunny afternoon with good views over the countryside. We were able to see many Juniper bushes and the students made drawings and took a video recording for the rest of the class to see. (See separate report alongside, and photographs.)

Later in September they will be taken to see the cuttings which we took in the Spring, being grown under a mist propagator at a nursery in Cheltenham. Mrs. Ros Harris sent me a very encouraging letter about the number and varied types of flowers and butterflies she has seen on the common. She was of the opinion that this was partly due to the Groups efforts clearing scrub last winter. It is pleasant to receive uncritical comments on our work. This summer has been a good one for the grassland plants and flowers. The small green flowered musk orchid has been particularly plentiful in the areas of short grass, the students had difficulty avoiding them when looking at the Junipers. Yellow carpets of Horseshoe vetch have made some of the old quarries very colourful. They are the food plant of some of the blue Butterflies, in particular the Chalk-hill Blue which is on the wing now. The Brown butterfly family of Meadow browns, Gatekeepers, Ringlet, and Small heaths have been found in large numbers, not only on the Beacon but also at Broadham Fields.

We look forward to seeing you at the grass cutting demonstration.

## **Quality Parish Councils**

Any expression using the word 'quality' when speaking of Parish Councils tends not to slip off the tongue. Indeed, despite an enormous amount of voluntary effort, considerable personal inconvenience and intrusion into their private lives, and unrelenting pressure from a diverse community they try hard to voluntarily represent, Parish Councillors tend to receive little or no recognition by way of thanks for their efforts. As one who has been a very close observer of councillors at all levels of Local Government for most of his career, I feel I am in as reasonable a position as anyone to observe the stresses and sometimes irreconcilable situations our elected (or co-opted) representatives face.

For more years than some can remember there has been a lobby which has tried to use every opportunity to bring about full recognition of the significance of government 'from the bottom up'; put another way, for rural communities such as ours the role of the Parish Council should be the first tier of such government - not the last, the also-rans.

The government has seized upon at least part of this movement for change, and this at a time when there is an ever increasing means of communication between individuals and the-powers-that-be. Among these changes has come the opportunity to attain, in a full formal sense, the status of 'Quality Parish Council'. The Painswick Parish Council is resolved to do all it can to achieve the standards laid down by HM Government in this regard, even though it has postponed at the moment submitting a request for such a status to be conferred. The postponement appears to be solely because our councillors want to know more about actual benefits such a formal status will bring to the community before committing themselves to possible increases in work-load and/or expense to be passed on to those paying Council Tax through the precept.

Meanwhile, and with some vigour, this Parish Council is doing all it can - with the support of the new Clerk Roy Balgobin - to comply with the tests the government have themselves set out. These include the following, only summarised for this report:

- **Electoral Mandate**: at least 80% of council seats filled by members who stood for election
- Qualified Clerk: holding a recognised certificate in Local Council Administration
- Council Meetings: minimum number each year, well run, publication of minutes, time for public participation, good attendance records of councillors
- **Communication**: effective communication and active involvement of the community represented, newsletters as appropriate
- Annual Reports: accountability, conduct and ethical matters.

The Beacon has noted a resolve among Parish Councillors in these aims, and looks forward to continuing its own reporting of matters raised at Council meetings in as objective a way as we can. Meanwhile readers may note the introduction of a Parish Council Email address, mentioned as *clerkpainswickpc@hotmail.com* elsewhere in this issue, and their aiming to get their own Web site created and 'on line' in the coming weeks.

Quality is never assured, but it is in that direction that they are pointing - realising of course that such is in no way to say that all in positions of responsibility have done their personal best for a century or so already!

# "Another Beastly Art Exhibition"





# HGV rumble to a September meeting

The Beacon noticed that, in another (but commercial) newspaper which circulates hereabouts, there was a recent report asserting that "Plans to stop the narrow streets of Painswick being congested with heavy goods vehicles are being discussed in a private meeting.." and that "The meeting will take place behind closed doors."

Somewhat bemused by this apparent change of policy of the Parish Council, the Beacon investigated.

Readers may recall that we reported in our June issue (page 4) on the subject of HGV raised and discussed at the Annual Parish Meeting: "The general feeling was summed up by Terry Parker from the chair, that the residents of New Street and the Council should draw together and make representations. He undertook to formulate a questionnaire based upon the documentation from Mr.Parfitt and this meeting for presentation to the County Highways Officers and, once their written response is to hand, convene a public meeting with their officers present to advance local interests."

Readers may wish to note that we have been reassured that it is certainly not the case that the matter will not be open to public discussion and report. Those who have experience of Local Government will be aware of the standard practice that officers endeavour to brief their elected councillors on subjects arising so that, in turn, they can ensure that the officer(s) have fully grasped the subject matter and completed their research prior to any public response. Chairman of the Parish Council, Terry Parker, told the Beacon "The facts are that there <u>is</u> to be a public meeting in early September. We are determined that we should not have one during the August holiday 'season', but am pleased that the GCC officers will thoroughly look into what we want to know before that meeting takes place. We have no intention of doing other than what we said we would, hold a meeting of which due notice is given, open to the public."

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## A week to remember

The Charter celebrations through the week of 4-12th July were, by any yardstick, enjoyable and memorable; a credit to our village. The Beacon is pleased to set out photographs, as reminders now and for the future, of aspects of each part of the programme which reached into every one of those eight days.

The dedicated needle-women of the Senior Circle produced a superb new banner, now gracing the wall of the main hall in the Town Hall; a fine depiction of aspects of our heritage as it relates to wool. The WI Market reminded us of their culinary skills, with many visiting their Friday market to sample a celebratory cake - while moving on to the stalls of weekly produce.

The Vox Angeli Choir, which we caught in full rehearsal on the Saturday afternoon, attracted an audience appreciative of their virtuosity and in so doing raising money for charity. The choir, at St.Mary's, and visitors to the other churches were also to be greeted with the finest displays of arranged flowers. The quiet garden to the rear of Our Lady and St. Thérèse, not normally visible to church visitors, was opened to the public and proved

to be a welcome refuge on the hot days that week. Much of the history of St. Mary's church was explained when many attended a presentation which included moving around the building and hearing about its evolution.

The Croft School Fair was colourful and superbly organised, and proved a point that despite its being coincident with certain Wimbledon finals, parents, friends and children knew what their priorities were - and where to fulfil them too! Two walks took place and, although

not too many children were to come along, the stroll around the centre of the village while features reminding us of the history of this place was greatly enjoyed and another way in which evidence of our past could be passed on to the next generation. The walk arranged by the Parish Council was clearly popular, and ventured beyond the village itself on a circular route.

Broadham Field was, as ever, an idyllic setting for a Painswick team to challenge one of the best from Cheltenham - no easy task as the results indicate. A wonderfully relaxing environment, quintessentially English, on a hot summer's day.

An exhibition prepared by the History Society completely filled the upper room of the Town Hall, with pictures, artifacts, drawings and numerous reminders of why we are justifiably proud of our heritage. A frieze of pictures and dates of significance had

been meticulously prepared by pupils and staff from the Croft School, a massive undertaking and very impressive in itself. Exhibitions of history are not noted for attracting the public, but that idea was turned on its head with over 300 visitors in one three hour period alone.


Three major events brought the week to its conclusion. The annual street market, retaining the theme of 'Victorian' as in recent years, must have been as well attended as any we can remember. Adding a medieval tinge to all the Victoriana, Painswick Players opened the day with 'King Henry Deferred & The Pirates of Painswick', which purported to be a re-enactment of the presentation of the Great Garter (or Charter) to the burghers of Painswick in 1253 and its subsequent loss to pirates. A great range of stall holders were accompanied by street performers providing continuous entertainment - some of it of local 'talent'. The weather was kind throughout the day with lengthy queues for roast refreshments, beverages and ices in great demand.

On Friday evening, a warm audience – in every sense of the word – packed into the Painswick Centre for an outstanding evening of 'Living Legends' celebrating 80 years of the Painswick Players. One of the many highlights was a 'Salad Days' selection under the direction of the composer and PP president, Julian Slade.

A costume ball in Painswick Centre was an elegant way in which to unwind from the hectic pace of a week of memorable events. It was not only well attended, but conducted in a manner which residents from a hundred

years ago would instantly have recognised and applauded.

A week arranged with energy and care, with a great debt owed to those who so willingly gave of their time so that hundreds could enjoy themselves while being reminded of what makes Painswick such a wonderful place. A significant number who came to these celebrations were from other parts of the world, and their interest in our pleasures and where we live was very clear to see. Could it be that a Royal Charter was itself a 'draw'? Might planning commence for the 760th celebration, with such comparable annual events attracting the use of Charter Market as a way of bringing in visitors?



## Living Legends - The Movie!

It was a memorable evening. The audience was warm: they could hardly be anything else with a couple of hundred bodies (or 179, if you're the Fire Officer) packed into the Painswick Centre. In fact, the scene was quite extraordinary, with people wedged in everywhere, sitting on the lighting desk, standing round the sides, hanging from the beams... (OK, I'm lying about the beams). But, was what we were trying to do – celebrate and tell the story of eighty years of drama in Painswick in eighty odd minutes – actually possible?

The *Living Legends* format - a dozen excerpts from very different productions and eras, all rehearsed separately - was always fraught with problems. Had we got the mix right: the balance between serious and comic, music and drama, poetry and prose? Would all the excerpts be ready in time? Could this eclectic mix of bits be glued together to make a seamless show? And, of course, would we get an audience to watch it?

Just over a week before the performance, the tickets were about half sold and we had

our first attempted run through. As the one responsible for linking it all together, I had one of those 'Ikea moments'... you know: one of those moments when you realise that the chic bedroom suite you thought you were assembling is going to look more like a prime contender for the Turner Prize. A few days later and a recognisable show was beginning to take shape. And



ticket sales were picking up. Come the final dress rehearsal, there was a real buzz that something special was happening. And the 'SOLD OUT – STANDING ROOM ONLY' signs went up.

Nevertheless, there was still plenty of 'creative tension' around backstage as the curtains opened for the opening number, *Painswick Am. Dramatical* from the 1997 *Acting Funny* revue. We needn't have worried: the audience responded immediately. Everyone seemed to want to celebrate with us. Here was an audience looking to enjoy itself and be part of history. I only had to mention Julian Slade's name to get a tumultuous round of applause. They were even laughing at my jokes! *(which have long been part of history – Editor)* It was indeed all vintage stuff: even the programmes made their traditionally dramatic late entry just ten minutes before the start (flown in from Glasgow – don't ask!) and still sold out five minutes before curtain up.

It would be invidious to single out individual pieces. So I shall: the sparkling *Salad Days* excerpts (with Richard Murray and Enid Walklett recreating their original 1984 roles), the explosive *Luck be a lady tonight* (with Richard



Murray again as Sky Masterson), the electrifying *Lady Macbeth* from Lesley Wolowiec, the choreographed brilliance of Alistair Anderson and his *Master & The Maid* silent movie team, the memorably *pukka* Georgina Sutton (and her memorably *pukka* knees!), the sheer cross-legged desperation of Pauline Foreman's Ladies seeking the *Ladies in the Lords*, the stylish 'handbag' scene from *Importance Of Being Earnest* (with Pauline Foreman and newcomers John Torr and Sheree Carver), the evocative and beautifully paced *Resting Place* from Judy Reed and Derek Hodges, and the foot-stamping *Stepping Out* finale.

And if all this were not enough, we had Julian Slade as well. It was a memorable evening.



#### **Painswick Show Society**

I am instructed to write to you in respect of a letter from Mr & Mrs R.EIvidge, which you published in the May issue of the Painsvvick Beacon.

Our purpose herein is to correct inaccura-



cies contained in that letter. Firstly, Mr & Mrs Elvidge state "we too were astonished and most disappointed to leam that there is to be no Painswick Show this year .... we agreed (the proposed date August 9) with enthusiasm and... we heard nothing more until receipt of our copy of last month's (the June edition - Ed.) Beacon.

In fact, I wrote to Rusty Elvidge by e-mail on 27 March 2003 and stated "I very much regret that the siting of the newly-planted trees will ivoke the doctrine of supervening impossibility as far as our organising this year's Show in the Park is concerned. We shall have to make an announcement in the Painswick Beacon to this effect in order that our supporters may know".

Secondly, Mr & Mrs Elvidge state in their letter to you "We have planted eighty trees in the Park.... The area used for the showjumping has, however, been deliberately left clear".

That claim is most surprising in view of the fact that Mr Elvidge had already written the following by e-mail to the Painswick Show Society Secretary, on 30 January 2003. "Tree plantlng has taken place - there are some where thejumping takes place, but I should imagine they will cause no problem, though suggest you take a look".

We did take a look, accompanied by a British Show Jumping Association official, whose advice we had specifically sought, and this led immediately to our 27 March e-mail advice referred to above in respect of the doctrine of supervening impossibility.

It is our opinion that the Beacon management could have avoided any protracted correspondence by seeking a response from us before publishing Mr & Mrs Elvidge's letter.

Ordinarily, we would not wish to write to you in respect of the foregoing but public reaction to your action has made it necessary.

I cannot understand Douglas Robinson's argument that hunting with dogs - fox hunting - should be allowed.

I do not think 85 hours in one year is over much time to debate this matter - just over an hour a week by my reckoning.

All the other matters mentioned are important I know, but this matter of fox hunting is cruel, barbaric and obscene and totally unsuccessful in getting rid of foxes.

It is well known that foxes are bred purposely to breed more foxes so that these mindless people can hunt them to satisfy their inhumane lust for the thrill of allowing other animals to hunt, catch and literally tear to bits a defenceless animal. Why don't the farmers and any one else practice good husbandry?

It sickens me to see the women too who can let their children watch and indulge in such cruel practices. We are becoming more and more barbaric in our attitude towards animals - what chance have we of teaching young children to have compassion towards animals while this practice is allowed to continue?

We humans are supposed to be the highest of the primates, but we can learn an awful lot from the animals. They have a far superior code of behaviour than we do. I suppose it gives these people a feeling of superiority and power to chase and kill.

I am afraid I have never earned my living by indulging in such cruelty. The end does not justify the means.

I find these people totally mindless, selfish and very shallow.

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## Making Hay While the Sun Shines

The old riddle of "When is a door not a door" may equally be applied to gates. A gate is definitely not a gate when it is removed from its secure position and thrown on the ground. Footpath users did this to one of my gates on Sunday 29th June. The gate was between a grazing field and one that was to be mown for hay. The grazing sheep took advantage of the absence of a gate to avail themselves of an unexpectedly tasty Sunday lunch.

Far from being a day of rest for me, this

Sunday was a particularly busy and vital working day. I had two fields of hay to bale and get in before the forecasted rain arrived that evening. I duly baled the first field with the conventional baler, broke off to extract the sheep from the tall mowing grass, and then hauled the 320 bales in. I had managed to bale 12 round bales in the second field when the rain arrived. The remainder of the field was baled exactly a week later, having seen three wet days and having been turned four more times to dry the hay. I collected a further 24 round bales of a distinctly black colour. Had I not been distracted by the sheep round up, all my hay would have been baled as good winter feed. As a result of a stupid act I lost approximately £240 in value of hay, and time that could have been more

> usefully spent in cutting and making a further field.


