PARISH COUNCIL NEWS 21st November by Leslie Brotherton

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to highlight points of widest public interest, based upon what we see and hear.

The full minutes of Council and committee meetings are available for scrutiny at the Council's office.



PLANNING COMMITTEE

Telephone exchange

Concerns that an application for two further louvred windows through which heat could be vented might cause noise nuisance to a neighbour led to opposing the submission.

Catbrain quarry

It was reported that open, regular and candid dialogue with management was an on-going matter with the Council, and confidence had been achieved that they were anxious to be helpful regarding all enquiries or concerns,

The public were welcome to approach them direct in all business hours or through the Clerk.

13 Upper Washwell

Concerns were expressed that roofing tiles to the new extension were not matching those existing on the main roof. The District Council had satisfied themselves that the closeness of match was acceptable.

Old Bakery: change of use

The Council had opposed the application to change from retail to office use, but the District Council had approved.

WASTE INCINERATOR PLANT

The Council received a 30-minute presentation by Urbaser Balfour Beatty, whom they had invited, upon the proposed plant at Javelin Park.

Facts and figures were rolled out, as was a full explanation of the layout of the intended structures, the significant flow of vehicles discharging their collections of domestic and commercial waste products, the filtering of emissions together with absence of smoke/pollutants, etc..

The design had addressed disposal of waste for Gloucestershire alone, with current levels of 276,000 tons a year for which solutions other than landfill must be found.

The Beacon cannot hope to set out all the pros and cons of such a major project to be located within a couple of miles of the civil parish and certainly prominent in the Vale of Glous, but can urge residents with concerns to access on line information for themselves. The Parish Council will contribute its views with regard to the planning application, which is on the table, at its next meeting on 12th December. Maybe that is one channel through which to register an opinion.

If wondering where to start researching pros and cons, the GlosVain web site is unreservedly con, whilst the Urbaser Balfour Beatty site offers reverse data and exhaustive facts about their intentions.

PARISH COUNCIL

Whether the change becomes the norm,

one cannot predict, but returning to reporting such meetings revealed a distinctly different approach. Considerable work had taken place in committees of the Council, as is the practice elsewhere, and such focussed debate in the full meeting.

Indeed, Chairman Martin Slinger brooked little waffle, and matters were despatched with some gusto.

Co-options

No nominations had been received to fill the vacancy in Slad Ward.

County Councillor's report

Joan Nash reported upon highways and preparation for winter conditions, update of the 'flood guide' circulated to all in the county, the survey of carers and personal budgeting support, and the desirability of attracting voluntary help on young offender panels. She made mention of the £10k allocation she was able to direct, and was expecting to allocate a portion to prompt resurfacing of Damsells Lane.

Flyer - 'Wake up Painswickians'

The Council took note of the recent 'yellow' flyer and, especially, a letter received from Terry Parker in which he drew attention to the range of developments in recent times which seemed to gainsay the core question put in the circular; e.g. community library, relocation of the tourist office, impending modernisation of the youth club premises and the creation of pedestrian route from the car park to the churchyard, the History Society notice boards and news that Christ Church may become an arts centre.

A much longer and stronger letter from Jackie Herbert was also read out.

Although the campaign had not been endorsed by the council, members were hopeful that any suggestions forthcoming from the flyer would be fed into their consideration of a revised Parish Plan. (That this will be so has subsequently been confirmed to the Beacon.)

Pavilion - Recreation Field

The Council was reminded that the GCC had set aside £45k from the proceeds of sale of the old library premises towards refurbishment of the Pavilion, not least to upgrade its use by the youth club. Plans for upgrading at a total cost of £98k had been prompted by the club, with free architect services they had attracted.

Caroline White reported on behalf of the Land and Buildings Committee their study of the proposals and funding, and obtained the Council's support for applying to the Public Works Loan Board for £20k funding repayable over 10 years to bring the assured total to £65k, there being indications that grants would be likely for others towards achieving the total desired.

All resources thus marshalled would

give priority to the exterior fabric of the premises - roof, windows and doors before such as changing rooms. The property would. of course, remain in the ownership of the Parish Council.

Public conveniences - St Mary's Street Mrs White proceeded to report upon the sub-standard condition of these toilets

sub-standard condition of these toilets and their embarrassment to the Council and the village.

It was agreed that a public consultation should be initiated early in 2013 upon three options

- minimal refurbishing at about £10k
- full refurbishment at £25k-35k
- selling on the open market for between £50k and £100k and utilising the proceeds for other services.

Budget and, hence, precept 2013-14

A detailed budget was tabled by the Finance and General Purposes Committee, and closely examined. The Clerk reported upon consultations with users of the Town Hall and supplied other supplementary information, and charges for room hire and interment were slightly increased.

A grant to the Art Couture organisers could not be considered at this time in the absence of supporting accounts, although these are being prepared and anticipated for a later meeting.

After a crisp discussion upon all aspects the budget was approved, subject to changes regarding first £1100 repayment of PWLB loan (*see above*) in 2013.

The Council fixed the precept upon the District Council at £77,160 in money terms, and having regard for the prevailing economic climate; the SDC being requested to not revise that figure if adjustments were offing for population changes, etc.. This means no change in the parish precept to that of the previous 2012-13 year.


Rob Lewis indicated his investigating attracting a cadre of volunteers next year, as in Rodborough, to undertake checks.

CCTV

Similarly, Mr Lewis was looking into any police interest in the value of CCTV coverage of parts of the village.

Parish (Action) Plan

The Working Group had appointed Terry Parker as its Chairman, and was seeking to update the 2008 edition of Part II of the previous plan. The Group had suggested that a public consultation be held in February upon the Council's draft action plan, and this was agreed. The Working Group meet next week, on 4th December.

Since 26th November patients and service users across Gloucestershire will benefit from cheaper call rates to the NHS as the county's health organisations move over to new telephone systems. This means that calls from landlines and mobile phones are charged at no more than the cost of a call to an 01 or 02 number. By changing the telephone numbers, almost all hospitals, clinics and services in the county will use the cheaper 0300 numbers instead of the previous 0845 numbers.

As well as coffee and mince pies, we will have a variety of stalls and raffle. We hope to see you all there and as always we appreciate all the support Painswick gives us.





Dog fouling and dog control are important issues - - District Council statement

Not picking up after your dog is a real issue that we all find unpleasant, and one which poses health risks – particularly to children and teenagers. New measures, which focus on prevention, will help reduce these problems even further. These allow local authorities to adopt 'Dog Control Orders' to try and tackle the problem and Stroud District Council has adopted them as of 1st December 2012.

Action can be taken for:


- Failing to remove dog faeces
- Not keeping a dog on a lead in a designated area
- Not putting and keeping, a dog on a lead when directed to do so by an authorised officer
- Permitting a dog to enter land from which dogs are excluded.

The order relating to dog fouling applies to all land within the district which is open to the air and to which the public have a right of access (with or without payment). This will include all common and access land within the district.

Council officers will be working closely with National Trust Rangers on the commons to spread the word and give out leaflets advising the public about the new orders, as part of the initial educational campaign. Patrols will then take place and anyone witnessed failing to clean up after their dog is likely to receive a fixed penalty notice.

Many complaints are received every year from walkers, mountain bikers and other dog walkers saying they have trodden, run or cycled through un-cleared dog mess or had to hose their dogs down to remove other people's dogs mess from their pet's feet. Dog waste can also cause ill health effects in cattle if they eat affected grass, in some cases causing them to abort unborn calves.

Bax UK

Painswick music Not unlike British Opera, British symphonies appreciation also tend to remain quite unreasonably neglected. group On 18th October, our presenter friend Ian Hiscock set out to show how unjustified this was in the case of Sir Arnold Bax by playing excerpts from each of his 7 symphonies, composed from 1922 to 1937. Bax, a most original composer (and poet), best known for his tone poems, was a structural genius and great orchestrator whose musical style combined romanticism (a "brazen romantic" he called himself) with lyricism, often with elements of Irish literature

The development of the symphonies represented a great composer's strong and powerful journey: no. 4 happy and breezy - "Bax Sea Symphony", no.5 dedicated to Sibelius, fantastic last movement, and no.6 incredibly powerful and one

Ian told us that the study of Bax' music had proved a revelation to him that made him quite emotional at times - he certainly

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Wayward birds

On the 23rd October in the Church Rooms the Bird Club joined with Yew Trees WI for a very successful meeting. Dominic Couzens, bird-study tour leader, author and TV presenter, came to relate human insights into "Birds Behaving Badly!"

These proved fascinating, often amusing, without escaping from the harsh realities that are evidently commonplace in most birds' lives. Birds have

featured as symbols and in omens over the centuries and indeed

are encrypted in our language, "pecking order" popularly indicating business or even social standing! Rather obviously size, sex and aggressiveness determine avian pecking order, though a male feeding another mature male is in the nature of a Munich manoeuvre. A clever rook "at the top of the tree," (accidentally dumps on his (literal) inferiors), perhaps until a (financial) wind blows?

So who'd be a surfacing coot with 200 gadwalls ready to grab its breakfast or a fieldfare with such ascetic dietery choices from only four berry varieties compared with the catholic blackbird's 23! While robins evidently and most prudently, "get engaged" and dunnocks are devoutly monogamous, female corn buntings go for multiple choice with up to 18

males to indulge her – realistically on hand to feed her young and guarantee species survival. These then, are a few examples of the stimulating data presented to us.

The next meeting will be on 5th February, when Graham Maples, Vice-President of the Friends of Slimbridge, will talk to us about World Wildfowl and their Conservation. Certainly a date to look forward to!

Helping to keep the Post Office open

David Linsell (812464) offers this very significant advice.

As treasurer of the Community Lunches I was interested to discover a bank account that can be fully operated at the Post Office.

You can make both cheque and cash deposits, and a cheque book is provided for payments out. There are no charges other than when overdrawn, and no interest is added to the balance (but neither was it at our previous bank).

Could I urge all treasurers of Clubs and Societies in the village to consider using this facility.

Manorship records

Stephen Friar writes:

As an historian, I have a strong conviction that we should remember people from the past - whether famous or ordinary. We should judge people by their own time rather than by ours and we should remember and recognise all the actions, large and small, everyday and extraordinary, which contribute to how we live today.

An important part of this remembrance - essential once time progresses beyond living memory - is the need to preserve archives. I understand that Painswick's manorial records have not been lodged in the Public Record Office where they would be open to inspection and protected from decay.

You can close your eyes to things you don't want to see, but you can't close your heart to the things you don't want to feel.





Barbara's Passion

Barbara Swindin has a real passion - mountains. Since she first discovered the joys of mountaineering whilst completing her degree at Birmingham University in the 1960s, this passion has permeated all aspects of her life. Her new book, All But One, indeed it is her first book, reflects the intensity of Barbara's feelings.

Her early childhood was spent in the

Stroud area, so not exactly high terrain. It was whilst studying modern languages at Birmingham that she first discovered hill-walking and within a very short time this extended to mountains and climbing in Europe. Returning to Gloucestershire Barbara joined the Gloucestershire Mountaineering Club

of which she is still a member and where she met her husband. After various jobs in industry she eventually became a teacher of languages in further education colleges.

As a teacher she was very committed to

her students and had a strong sense of purpose. However, as she points out, "every spare second was spent in the mountains." This had most definitely become a lifelong passion. By the 1970s she had developed classic climbing skills and was particularly keen on tackling snow conditions in both Britain and Europe.

From very early on she was aware of the fact that the world of mountaineering was

male-dominated. No matter how skilled they were, women never led the teams. Women had been involved in climbing since Victorian times and particularly after the First World War there were some notable, not to say feisty, ladies determined to scale the same heights as men. Many of these women feature in Barbara's

book. There are some stunning photographs of them.

The book is autobiographical covering all aspects of Barbara's life, though the

mountains do tend to be present throughout. She draws comparisons between her own late 20th century experiences and the real struggles and fighting spirit of the early women climbers. As she says, things are different now with better equipment and much-changed attitudes. It has taken women more than 100 years to reach equality with men in the climbing world. After retiring from teaching Barbara took an Art Access course at Stroud College and can now be found working in one of the spaces in the Art Studios of the Painswick Centre. Her work, mostly of mountainous areas, reflects her passion and her paintings are strongly impressionistic in that they portray her feelings and views of the scenes she so loves. They are very evocative.

Barbara is certain that this is a unique book because of its focus on women. She was prompted to write it by the fact that a woman has at last climbed the Alpine Four-thousanders and thus achieved equal status in the climbing world. It is a remarkable book, beautifully illustrated and definitely written with passion. It is available from the Art Studios at the Centre and from the Post Office.

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

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Exciting plans for youth facilities

In May 2011, the Parish Council, in collaboration with the Painswick Youth football Club, PSALMS' Local Management Group and the junior section of the Cricket Club submitted an Application to the County Council under the 'Big Community Offer' for a £45k grant towards the cost of improving facilities for the young people of Painswick at the Recreation Ground. These funds were to come from the balance of the sale pro-

ceeds of the old Library building after the move of the Library to its existing location in the Town Hall.

Full plans and specifications have now been prepared by locally based architect, Richard Falconer, for the complete renovation of the Youth Club building and these are under discussion with the Parish Council whose approval is required before funds will be passed across by the County before the end of this year. The full programme of work (which may require some extra fund-raising) will involve a reconfiguration of the interior of the building to enlarge the meeting space and modernise the kitchen and toilet facilities; it will provide an excellent venue in which to carry out

local Youth work and provide changing facilities and a social centre for the sports teams. The consortium is extremely grateful to Richard Falconer, local structural engineer, Alan Price and Gloucester based quantity surveyor, David Smith, all of whom have given their time and expertise for free.

More details of this exciting project and the vision for the future will be made available once the Parish Council have given their approval but in parallel to those discussions, the Youth Football Club have been working on essential plans to configure two youth size flat pitches at the Recreation Ground for discussion with the trustees. The Club is thriving with now seven age group teams involving up to 86 children on a regular basis. The Football Association, as part of its national youth development programme, have now introduced clear rules on the different size pitches required for each age group band and

the intention is to provide a pitch for 9 players vs 9, and a further pitch for 7 players vs 7 for the younger ones. This will enable the Club to continue playing in Painswick, rather than having to move elsewhere to be able to comply with the new regulations

Again this will involve some fund-raising but it is very much hoped that the Football Association will provide matched funding to that raised locally, and that the local Community will really get behind this project. It is still early days and cost indications for this part of the development are not yet available but some plans have been drawn up by for discussion with

the Recreation Ground Trustees.

All in all, this is a really exciting opportunity to provide some appropriate facilities for the young people of Painswick on a par with those in other local communities like Minchinhampton, Bussage etc. Beacon readers will be kept regularly informed as the story unfolds but any offers of help for this Community project will be much appreciated.

many small ash trees down to knee height. Why? Nothing to do with disease risks but we have left them for specialist attention. We are not qualified to apply Glyphosate precisely to the cut stems where the sap is 'falling' at this time of year and will pull the chemical down to where it will be most effective. The specialist will trace the remaining stems, cut them off at ground level and paint on a film of coloured chemical.


We haven't been able to start grazing yet since the Belties are not available to loan this season. As I write we are following several leads and hope soon to find some placid, rugged grazers. They may be Galloways, Dexters or possibly locally appropriate Gloucesters.

There was a record attendance boosted no doubt by those anticipating the intriguing talk by Amaury Blow and the animated discussion about Catbrain Quarry that followed. Post Offices

There are well over twenty official post offices in my constituency and I am determined that they all remain open. Following a recent meeting with the Post Office, I am assured that they are all sustainable and secure. Naturally, changes in personnel and the introduction of the modernisation programme may have temporary impacts on service but closure of any is not an option. Recently, for example, Amberley Post Office has been placed on a firm footing after the retirement of the postmistress and the successful recruitment of a replacement. The modernisation programme coupled to the Coalition Government's investment in the network should give reassurance to all customers and Post Offices. My office can supply you with more details on the Post Office network and future plans if required.

There is more good news. The Post Office has won the contract with DLVA (Department of Transport) to continue to issue road licences and related matters. This further strengthens the capacity of the Post Offices to meet your community's needs in the future.

Broadband

Many of you will be aware of my campaign to improve broadband access. Several Councils were represented at my launch event with Jeremy Hunt, the then Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport, and others have been in direct contact with me about particular areas of concern, I am

pleased to say that a new phase of investment is about to start, focusing on Brimscombe and Dursley.

This is brilliant news but I know there is more to be achieved in other areas. The key is to ensure that the providers of Broadband are aware of the likely demand if the necessary infrastructure is in place and, in any event, I am aiming for over 90% much improved coverage by 2015. Please contact my office if I can help to promote your case for upgrading.


Villages and Towns

• There is no savings limit for Pension Credit, but if you have over £10,000 this will affect the amount

*About 4 million older people are entitled to Pension Credit, yet about a third of those eligible are still not claiming it. The average payment is about £1,700 a year, so it could really boost your income. There are two parts to Pension Credit – you may be eligible to receive one or both of them.

Guarantee Credit tops up your weekly income to a guaranteed minimum level set by the Government.

Savings Credit is extra money for people who have an income higher than the Basic State Pension or who have a small amount of savings. It provides up to an additional £18.54 for single people or £23.73 for couples.

It's worth claiming Pension Credit even if you're only entitled to a small amount, as it can help you qualify for other benefits. Can you claim it?

- The minimum age to qualify for Guarantee Credit is gradually rising. From April 2012, it is 61. If you turned 60 after 6 April 2010, you can check when you qualify by calling Age UK Advice or the Pension Service.
- Generally, you could receive Guarantee Credit if your weekly income is less than £142.70 if you're single or £217.90 if you're a couple.
- The minimum age for Savings Credit is 65. You may get some Savings Credit if you have a higher weekly income normally up to about £189 if you're single or £278 if you're a couple.

• All these amounts could be much higher if you are severely

you receive.

If you receive Pension Credit, you may be entitled to a discount on your electricity bill, called the Warm Home Discount. Check with your energy supplier or ask a local advice agency like Age UK. Find out more on the Directgov website (www.direct.gov.uk).

How do you claim?

You can claim Pension Credit by calling the Pension Service on 0800 99 1234. They will ask you questions over the phone and fill the form in for you.

Alternatively, I can arrange a home visit for someone to fill in the forms for you if you are unable to get to an adviser such as Age UK. I've given details of Internet sites for those who wish to use them and I can get you more information if you don't have (or don't want to use) a computer.

There are other ways that you might be able to save money such as getting council tax benefits, money off your water rates, additional benefits to help with care, and so on. Give me a call to arrange a visit and together we'll see what we can do. I wish you all a peaceful, healthy and happy festive season and look forward to seeing you in the New Year.


