Painswick's donations for Ukraine

Veronika Dutfield, like many of us, was moved to try to help those suffering in Ukraine. She approached the Polish Association Gloucester to see how best Painswick people could help and what sort of donations were needed. A collection centre was needed and the Painswick Centre stepped in and offered the Skittle Alley. Then with publicity through Facebook, help from The Croft school and the Painswick Centre donations came pouring in through the generosity of Painswick people as seen from the photograph.

None of this would have materialised, had she not teamed up with Silvia Kuzma, who had other contacts that made the operation happen quickly. These donations all had to be sorted into boxes as required by the Polish embassy all done by



volunteers. The next thing was transport for the boxes to the Gloucester warehouse. This was achieved with the help of local companies lending their vans taking three full loads to Gloucester. As seen in the local TV and press the Gloucester warehouse operation grew and grew sending five 44 tonne trucks to Poland.



For the future Veronika is trying to find a local hall to act as a collection centre for Painswick and with others a new warehouse in Gloucester, but as of 24th March this search has been unsuccessful. Matters requiring a decision: The Committee agreed to make the following recommendations to the District Council. S.22/0437/LBC. Hambutts End, Edge Road. Retrospective permission for the demolition of domestic garage & integral stone wall & permission to replace demolished garage.

Reports

County Council

Cllr Williams who was unable to attend the meeting because of illness had submitted a report which is available on the Parish Council website. In her report she confirmed that the County Council had approved a £521 million budget for the Financial Year 2022/23. The budget was an increase of £38 million on 2021/22 levels. She reported that, despite the extra investment, the council was expected to have one of the lowest council tax levels of any county council. Funding had been agreed for 26 miles of cycle track from Stroud to Bishops Cleeve as well as investment in our market towns and high streets and ongoing support and protection of the most vulnerable in our communities. Other areas within the budget were £100 million for roads, £150 million investment in school buildings and £1 million annually to tackle climate change.

District Council. Cllr Bullingham gave

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an update on various District Council current issues including, the council's Jubilee website, Council Tax rebates and council committee structures.

Chairman. Cllr Slinger reported that groups and societies had begun again to use the Town Hall and the Youth and Community Pavilion. It was the intention that the Parish Council meet with The Croft School and Youth Club members early in 2023. He concluded his report in reminding the Members to submit their comments on the draft Parish Plan update which had been circulated.

Annual Parish Meeting. The Council agreed to hold its Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday 4th May and hold a drop in event with various community groups, public services, and Parish Council members.

Tree planting. The Council agreed to plant a silver birch tree on the Recreation Ground to commemorate the Queen's Jubilee and to give further consideration to the locations for donated trees.

Audio and Visual Facilities in the Town Hall.

The Council approved a quotation to improve the audio and visual facilities in the Town Hall.

Recommendations of the Finance and Personnel Committee.

Town Hall and Youth and Community Pavilion. The Council agreed to leave the charges unchanged with the exception of the library rental which is to be increased by 10% and fixed for the next 3 years. Cemetery Fees. The Council agreed to, leave the Cemetery Fees unchanged. Grants for 2022/23. The Council approved the following grants for the FY 2022/23. Stroud Citizens Advice. £500.00 County Air Ambulance. £100.00 Sheepscombe Lunch. £100.00 Painswick Beacon Conservation. £400.00 Sportily. £100.00 Painswick Friday Club. £100.00 Total £1,300.00

The difference appears to be that C1 refers to Hotels, Guest Houses etc whilst the C3 refers to Dwellinghouse with specified restrictions which may make a later change to Residential use easier.

CNFC has two meetings in April, the first on Wednesday 13th April in the

Painswick Centre at the earlier start time of 2 pm to allow the AGM to be held before the talk by photographer and naturalist Philip Mugridge. Philip will be giving an illustrated talk on 'Iceland: Land of Fire and Brilliant Birds'.

We have now held two successful meetings in Box Village Hall, well supported by members from Minchinhampton and Painswick areas. On Tuesday 19th April at 2.30 pm, Debbie Devauden will give a talk entitled 'A History of Botanical Illustration from Cave Drawings to the Present'. After studying Botanical Illustration at the Chelsea Physic Garden, Debbie teaches and exhibits regularly in Wales and the Southwest. She also chairs the Gloucestershire Society of Botanical Illustration which holds an annual display of work at Nature in Art. We welcome visitors to our meetings which conclude with refreshments; members pay £1 and visitors £4.

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Stroud and Cotswold Citizens Advice.... "We are still here"

As we all try to recover from the effects of the pandemic here are 5 important points about your local Citizens Advice:

- We are a local charity, totally independent of government, providing free confidential impartial advice to everyone in Stroud District areas, including Dursley, Stonehouse, Nailsworth, Wotton-Under-Edge and Berkeley. The same service is available to everyone in Cotswold District, including Cirencester, Tetbury and Moreton-in-Marsh. The delivery of our service relies on the dedication of our fully trained volunteers supported by a small team of paid staff. We have been providing a service in Stroud since 1958, when we were known as the CAB.
- Your local Citizens Advice office continued to operate a limited service during the Pandemic with volunteer members of staff working from home. Now that restrictions are being eased, we are working very hard to manage face to face interviews again, which are vital to many people. We are also making every effort to reopen our outreach and community hub services.
- Our main areas of enquiry at this time are: employment, energy issues, welfare benefits and debt issues. Since December 2021 we have given information and support to 705 members of our local community. We are extremely grateful for our core funding from the District, Town and Parish Councils, but we still need to raise an additional £25,000 every year to maintain the service.
- Citizens Advice in Stroud has a very active PR and Fundraising Committee who continue to organise fundraising events to help finance such essentials as training and improved technology, as well as improved premises. We are extremely grateful for all donations, especially from our donors who provide us with annual standing orders, one off donations and legacies. This source of funding is vital to the continuation of our service.

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Casting Stones at Napier's Bones



The title of the talk given by Malcolm Watkins on Wed 4th Mar 2022 was somewhat narrower than the scope of this interesting presentation which spanned the history of numeracy and calculating from ancient times. In Roman times of course Roman numerals were in use in Britain and the abacus was already well established for calculations. Abacuses often took the form of a portable mat marked with lines and Roman numerals which could be spread out on a shop-counter between traders and used to calculate a bill.

Not until the 16th Century did mathematicians such as John Napier start to transform calculation by devising the concept of logarithms which enabled large and complicated multiplication and division operations to be achieved by simple addition and subtraction, speeding up the process and reducing the scope for human error. The advent of printing led to the publication of the method and the familiar logarithm tables. Napier then developed another method for reducing difficult calculations to simple addition and subtraction processes. The method required a set of inscribed square section index rods which with practice could be used by relatively innumerate people. A set of 10 Napier's rods, or Napier's bones when made from ivory, allowed for most calculations to be made.

Malcolm continued by describing how other mathematicians were inspired by Napier's work, notably Henry Briggs, Edmund Gunter, and Walter Schickard. Ultimately calculating machine designs appeared, but with limited efficiency and capacity. Perhaps the highlight of Malcolm's talk was Blaise Pascal's machine, known as the Pascaline, which he designed to relieve his father of tedious calculations!

Save our Gloucestershire Stone Stiles

You were kind enough to show an interest in this project. With enormous help from well over 100 enthusiastic countryside walkers we have recorded 90-95% of the county's stone stiles which are an historic part of our Cotswold landscape.

Of late, project contributors are reporting that stone stiles are being removed and replaced with noisy metal kissing gates or just removed leaving gaps to ease the passage of ramblers. It seems our efforts to photograph all our stone stiles may just have been in time before many vanish. We have an enormous amount of work to do indexing them but the evidence has been assembled.



In April 2021 a new Countryside Code was launched and the wording of this may be encouraging the wanton destruction of stiles. The guidance includes making rights of way more accessible for visitors and goes on to suggest to land managers that they should ease access 'for visitors with different abilities and needs. Create gaps or put up accessible self-closing gates instead of stiles where there is public access, if possible.' British Standard BS 5709 also suggests for gaps gates and stiles replacement with self-closing gates. There is nothing wrong in easing access but does not mean destroying ancient stiles, often 300 or more years old, and an integral part of the countryside.

They should not be destroyed. It is perfectly reasonable to treasure them by placing alongside each a more rambler friendly access. Why not fund this through from ELMS – public money for public good. ELMS* funds stone walls, for their landscape value, so why not stone stiles as well and for their additional historic value.

Will you publicise the plight of our stone stiles and seek help to have them protected?

Madame Restell and the "Trow Cottages"

Following last month's article on Madame Restell, aka Ann Trow Lohman, of Painswick and New York, it may be of interest to know that Ann is believed to have supported her family in Painswick generously.

My great uncle, the late Bill Trow of Clattergrove, who was Ann Lohman's great nephew, often told me how she "went to America and became a millionairess". He knew that her fortune was made in the medical profession. Bill claimed that she bought (or had built) cottages in Painswick for her four brothers. He named three of the cottages as Columbus Cottage in Cheltenham Road, the cottage now attached to the Red House in Washwell Lane and Washwell Lane Cottage (now demolished). There are strong visual similarities between these properties. The name Columbus Cottage may also be a clue to the American connection.

I have not been able to find any documentation specifically linking Ann Trow Lohman to these property purchases, but census records confirm that her four brothers, John, James, Thomas and William Trow, did indeed occupy these properties with their families. Three were labourers and the fourth a carpenter, so it is unlikely that they were able to buy the cottages themselves. The family oral



tradition that their wealthy sister Ann was behind the purchase is likely to be accurate. When each brother died, his cottage was sold and the proceeds split among his children.

The two cottages in Washwell Lane are built on land shown as a field in the 1839 tithe map. The field was divided equally between the two properties. Columbus Cottage is built on part of the neighbouring field beside Cheltenham Road. I suspect that the fourth cottage was built on the other half of that field, where Greenacres stands today.

Ann Trow Lohman has been the subject of renewed research in recent years and a biographer visited Painswick in 2019 to view the cottages. Ann is also the subject of a play, 'Wickedest Woman', staged in New York in 2019 and at the centre of a novel 'Femme Fatale' by Carole Nelson Douglas. 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Winter Review.

We have now come to the end of our winter work party program so here is a summary of our activities.

After the increase in numbers helping during the peak of the Covid outbreak numbers attending has fallen back to more normal levels of 12-15 per session. This is still very good and recently three more

helpers have signed up.

PBCG is now registered as a Registered Charity. We felt this gives the group a more secure footing and opens up more possibilities to obtain funding from other charitable organisations. Gift Aid is also reclaimable on donations. We are currently applying for funds from the Farming in Protected Landscapes Scheme and it seems likely we will receive a lump sum from Natural England, so the financial position of the group is a lot healthier than

it was a year ago.

The other major change for us is the adoption of the NoFence paddock system and the addition of new water points on the Beacon. This really has been a game changer. It will save us a lot of money in the coming years and has allowed us to graze areas which have hitherto been impossible using electric fencing. We used to allow about a week to put up and take down the fencing for a paddock and the battery had to be changed every two weeks. Now it is possible for one person to move the cows into a new area in about one hour.



Including the month they were on Cud Hill, the cows have been out for eight months and have done a magnificent job. They have adapted very well to the tougher diet and are equally happy to browse on ivy and shrubs in the woodland or the open grassland. By utilising new areas we have been able to keep the cows out all winter without them losing too much condition and now the grass is starting to grow again.

The feedback from the public has been extremely positive, people loving seeing the cows freely roaming. There have been a couple of incidents where a cow has 'escaped', presumably chased by a dog, but the system shuts down and reactivates once the escapee rejoins the herd.

As to the work undertaken. A new area was cleared between the 8th and 10th tees and the wild flower seed sown in the autumn has started to show. Light scrub clearing was done on the ramparts and below the 16th tee. Many diseased ash and some pines were removed from the head of Victoria Quarry with the purpose of connecting it to Long Quarry. A tractor and flail were hired to cut back brambles efficiently and a major project to convert the bridle way off the Gloucester Road into a woodland ride was started.

Jottings

Just the other day we had Storm Eunice, so I delved into my records and came up with storms that have hit us since 1963. The terrible hard winter and spring of 1963, with prolonged deep snow, and terrible hard frosts that just went on and on.

Eight thirty am on the 28th of June 1963 a large lightning bolt hit the chimney of Jenkins Farm House Edge, the lightning went down the television wire taking the roof off as it went, because there was a 12 foot thick wall under the chimney; the house just sat there and took it, the old fuse boxes were imbedded in the oak beams, the electric wires in a lot of times the wire was on the outside of the insulation small fires everywhere. In the store room next door were turkey eggs in incubators; the insurance people said they looked like they had been hard boiled. The lightning then went up the wires to the cow shed it knocked my father out while he was on the floor the fuse boxes fled past him and hit the wall at the far end of the cow shed, my father and the cows where ok but never got over the shock. The lightning then went on up the wire to the big transformer on the pole and blew that to bits at what is now The Edgemoor, this is only part of the story it would take too long to give the full version.

These storms you might call small tornadoes. Up at the Plantation Woods a huge wind some 100 feet wide came up from Stroud and went straight through the wood felling a large number of trees thus leaving a large big hole of fallen trees with few left standing the hole in the tree line is still visible if you know where to look.

In the Wood between Bulls Cross and Juniper another wind some 50 feet wide came from Painswick and took out the centre of the wood felling nearly all the trees. A huge wind came across the valley from Stroud taking out part of Dutchcombe farm, one of our farm buildings, the chimneys of Lower Greenhouse and some old elm and apple trees.

A huge wind came along the valley side from Lullingsworth along the top of whats now Randalls field taking out tops of trees over Vicarage street, lifting fires in the grates up the chimneys and up to Washwell farm lifting fleeces up in the air. An extremely strong wind hit the bottom of the valley at Edge and as it could not get out it twisted out of the ground trees including 7 fully grown Beech trees over some 3 acres the storm could not get out of the valley the rain at this time was out of this world, I was sent to see if the cattle were OK, I met them at the gate all well.

One of the last Painswick Shows up at the Park on show day with everything in full swing, a strong wind came up through the show some 50 foot wide it took out and destroyed the pig roost and injured the chef the mobile toilets went flying, just hoping no person was in them at the time and it also damaged some of the other trade stands.

Using just a small selection of his collection of some 18,500 pictures we were taken on a comprehensive tour around the five valleys. The range of esselected ensured that everyone present was able to identify with some activity.

Overall, his collection contains all the well-known landscapes, buildings and people but they are shown in contrast with lesser known but equally fascinating past.

Lions Clubs Message in a Bottle Scheme

Lions Clubs Message in a Bottle is a simple but effective way for people to keep their basic personal and medical details where they can be found in an emergency on a standard form and in a common location - the fridge. Message in a Bottle helps emergency services personnel to save valuable time in identifying an individual very quickly and knowing if they have any allergies or take special medication.

Paramedics, police, fire-fighters and social services support this Lions life-saving initiative and know to look in the fridge when they see the Message in a Bottle stickers, supplied.

The initiative provides peace of mind that prompt and appropriate medical assistance can be provided, and next of kin/emergency contacts can be notified. It is not just vulnerable people who benefit from Message in a Bottle. Anyone living alone or with health conditions could have an accident at home.

The Message in a Bottle kit includes a form, where personal and medical information is detailed. This is placed in a bottle (with its distinctive green branding), which is stored in the fridge.Two stickers are provided: one for the fridge door and the other for the inside of the front door of the premises.

The Lions Club, Cheltenham, has kindly provided us with a stock of Message in a Bottle kits for our local community free of charge. Scams

At the Friday Hub in the Town Hall on the 11th March, Debbie Collicott, the local Police community officer, came along and circulated amongst the tables discussing any issues raised. Scams, especially for older people was a huge problem area, and the best way to combate this type of crime was awareness of the likely danger signals. Below are outlined a few of the more common and clever ones to watch out for....

Receiving messages (email or phone) from an unexpected person or company you have never heard of or from someone or a company you know but asking for something unusual. Scammers might set tight deadlines or ask for monies upfront. Maybe threaten risks of legal action or cutting off a service. They try to panic you or make you think unclearly. Obviously never give out account numbers. Passwords or national insurance numbers .

Never give anyone access to your computer if they ring claiming to be from technical support.

Do not use public Wi-Fi to transmit personal data or buy anything through an unsecured web site.

Do not open suspicious emails from unknown senders or open links or attachments.

Hang up on cold callers and cold texts.

Callers may pose as a bank, computer company or even the police claiming fraudulent activity and ask you to call the organisation to verify the request. They may keep the line open so use a different phone to do the check or wait 20minutes. Do not be rushed.

Beware of investment scams offering fraudulent investment opportunities or schemes that seem too good to be true. Always seek independent advice from another source.

Holiday fraud where scammers sell non-existent holidays, cottages or caravans which do not exist and encourage you to pay in advance for a better price. Check the Holiday is ABTA protected and use a credit card rather than a debit card.

GPs and IT

A lot has had to change as a result of the pandemic and the eConsult system has been a major part of this. The patient group welcome the plans to replace this very clunky system with something that is smoother for patients to use. This is planned to happen in association with the new website which is ready in prototype and going through validation. We understand that a new triage system will not come in straight away with the website change as it has to be investigated in depth to ensure compliance with regulations. Another change will be taking place on 10th May when a wholly new telephone system will be installed.

My favourite walks

It is best walked in dry weather as some of the paths can be muddy, and walking boots are recommended as some of the tracks are uneven and can be wet. It is always a good idea to walk with someone else for safety as well as companionship. And be aware that there are two quite high stiles. This article is too brief to set out the route in detail, so please take a map with you.

One of the reasons it is one of my favourites is because there is so much variety in the walk. There are great views across the valley, including some classic views of Painswick. There are narrow paths almost enveloped in vegetation, paths in open woodland and at the edge of fields. There is history and wildlife to spot.
