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# **Gloucestershire Police Male Voice Concert**

There was a large audience on Friday 13th October for the Gloucestershire Police Male Voice Choir's concert in aid of the St Mary's Church re-roofing project. The choir has raised well over £750, 000 for charitable causes during its 50 year history, and it was clear from the outset that they love singing under their charismatic young conductor Lucas Bailey. Their programme was wide ranging including songs from the shows, hymns and anthems, all sung from memory and with excellent diction.

In an expertly crafted programme, the choir sang two groups of 3 or 4 songs in each half, several from the 60's, 70's and 80's, and for many in the audience, this was clearly a much appreciated trip down memory lane. All were sung with passion and an appropriately wide dynamic range, and for me, particularly memorable performances included Sunrise, Sunset from Fiddler on the roof, Leonard Cohen's Hallelujah, Sondheim's Send in the clowns and Bring him home from Les Miserables, which was especially moving. Particular mention also has to go to California Dreaming and An American Trilogy, comprising All my trials Lord, the Battle Hymn of the Republic and Dixie,



both of which brought the house down, and will linger long in the memory. The choir was accompanied brilliantly throughout on the piano by Diane Martin.

The guest soloist was 13 year old Beatrice Myers-Dickinson, who is already an accomplished performer and held the rapt attention of the audience throughout her 5 songs which ranged from Schubert and Britten to Bernstein's Somewhere from West Side Story and Lloyd Webber's Wishing you were somehow here again from Phantom of the Opera. Beatrice also joined the choir for a lovely performance of Mozart's Ave verum corpus, and clearly has a great future ahead of her.

St Mary's is enormously grateful to the choir and Beatrice for providing such a delightful evening which raised a splendid total of just over £1000, and to Jane Burt for organising it and her helpers for serving the interval drinks..

# Large Blue Butterfly Reintroduction.

I was recently invited to attend a day of local site visits to learn more about this fascinating project.

Some of you may remember the large blue (LB) became extinct in Britain in 1979, the last record being made on Dartmoor. It took some years for ecologists to fathom out why this happened. Basically the LB needs a specific species of ant (Myrmica Sabuleti) to adopt its larvae over winter during which time they eat the ants' grubs, pupate and emerge in the early summer as an adult butterfly. This complex cycle collapsed when grazing ceased; longer vegetation cover caused the surface soil temperature to drop to the point where the temperature sensitive ants moved away. Also the LB food plant, wild thyme, was smothered by the longer vegetation.

Reintroductions were eventually made using grubs collected from some of the last strongholds of LB populations in Sweden. Dartmoor was chosen as the site for these early reintroductions but it was unsuccessful; just because the last records were from there didn't make it the best site to use.

Subsequent efforts on the Polden Hills in Somerset proved successful once the grazing regime was worked out. More recently reintroductions have been made in the Cotswolds and Daneway Banks has become the best site in Europe. The sites used are not always widely publicised for a number of reasons. Huge public interest would create car parking and access problems, some sites are privately owned and there are real concerns that illegal dealers would collect samples to sell on the black market.

Large amounts of data is now being collected about all aspects of this project and it is starting to reveal more fascinating insights into the ecology of the LB. For example marjoram is being used as a food plant. This is good news because marjoram is more drought tolerant and spring droughts, which are very detrimental to LBs, are becoming more common. Also it is a taller plant and can grow in longer vegetation. In a warming world this may help Myrmica Sabuleti stay, rather than being displaced by an ant which prefers higher temperatures but doesn't adopt LB larvae.

The temperature data collected already show the LB fly a week or two later in the Cotswolds than the Poldens, partly because they are further north but also higher altitude.

Daneway Banks is a really good example of how quality calcareous grassland should look; A good mixture of sward heights and a light scrub cover, maintained by grazing, and a number of mature trees blending into more mature woodland. Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust seem to have got it just right as LB numbers recently have exceeded what the site can support and are now populating adjacent suitable sites.

It is amazing how much effort has gone into helping a single species and, at first sight, this may seem unbalanced. However, that which benefits the LB also benefits a host of other plants, insects, fungi, birds, mammals and reptiles. On the Beacon we are creating habitat on a par with Daneway Banks and hopefully the LB will get established there too.

# Full-house in the Art Studios

The art studios in the Painswick Centre are an amazing asset for Painswick. A range of art skills are quietly exercised on a daily basis inside this section of the Centre and the outcomes are certainly very special. After a short period when not all of the units were occupied it is good to report that now each and every one of the six has an occupant, each with a different art specialism.

**Ange Mullen-Bryan** has been working in the studios for several years. Trained at Stroud School of Art followed by gaining a degree at the prestigious Winchester School of Art, Ange specialises in contemporary landscape oil painting. Often inspired by her beloved Nordic scenery her subjects tend to be deep forests, vast lakes, sunsets and snowscapes. These are often painted on coloured linens sourced from the Painswick Fabrics shop

**Isabella Hughes** is a recent graduate of the University of Gloucester and uses a local historical and geographical context as the basis of her work. The intention is to create a series of images using printmaking methods on to paper and fabric. She welcomes interested parties to submit old images, photos and stories which could translate well into this style of printmaking.

**Sarah Farwell** loves the translucency of watercolours though sometimes works with pastels. Floral subjects are her natural choice for their beauty and colour but recently has also been working on a series of small interior studies where light is the subject. Sarah has had a successful solo exhibition and also has had work exhibited in the RWA in Bristol and the Victoria Art Gallery in Bath.

## Painswick music appreciation group

On October 5th we celebrated the life and memory of Alex Nichols, our late Honorary President, whose love of Guiseppe Verdi was movingly represented by a DVD of the Requiem from the Hollywood Bowl. Dennis Morgan chose this fine 2013 performance under the baton of the celebrated Venezuelan Gustavo Dudamel and 4 soloists appropriately from the world of opera.

On November 19th we welcomed Elgar author Richard Westwood-Brookes of the Birthplace Museum (The Firs). He brilliantly summarised EDU's life from his humble beginnings, through advantageous marriage, to the summit of his reputation as England's greatest composer since Purcell. His financial rewards however proved meagre, and he

to the summit of his reputation as England's greatest composer since Purceii. His mancial rewards however proved meagre, and he eventually declined into the world of variety tours which paid well for a time: finally emerged his last great works, particularly the Piano Quintet (which book ended this presentation), and the Cello Concerto. The less often heard music selected ranged from early pieces (as Ted Elgar) composed for his siblings and friends, through early orchestral compositions Chanson de Matin and Sevilliana to his choral masterpiece the Kingdom, his symphonic poem Falstaff and the sublime Sospiri for string orchestra. We also heard the Organ Grinders song from Dream Children and settings of Kipling's The Fringes of the Fleet which he took on a lucrative tour alongside music hall acts until Rudyard pulled the plug.

## A read not to be missed



Reed's Mill. (now Painswick Mill), was for many Painswick residents for many years a truly significant building. It provided work first in the wool industry, then in pin making and during WW1 essential metal items for the war effort. The Reed family therefore has played an important part in the life of Painswick. Edward Reed

was the last of the Reeds involved, but that is not the end of the story. Edward's granddaughter, Merilyn, is an author and she has just published a truly engaging book, her second, which will be of great interest to Painswick residents.

Crossing the Rift is her grandmother's extraordinary story. Set in South Africa during World War 2, it recounts the undoubtedly perilous but at the same time fascinating journey which Elf, aged 64, undertook to rejoin her unsuspecting husband. She had been helping the war effort in South Africa but felt impelled to pack her bag and travel, alone, up through the entire continent of Africa from Cape Town to Palestine to reunite with him. A journey of 6,418 miles, this was some undertaking, both incredibly challenging but also stunningly beautiful and full of interest.

The book is based on Elf's handwritten journal in which she relates the details of her extraordinary route. Merilyn describes this experience whilst also exploring the story of Elf's former Edwardian life in Stroud and Painswick. Much of her young orphaned life was spent at Vale House, Ebley, and then at Reed's Mill, Painswick after marrying Edward. In the story she spends much time whilst on her intrepid journey reflecting on her past Painswick and Stroud life, both tragic and challenging, and indeed on life generally in the Cotswolds at this interesting bygone period.

This is the story of a truly courageous and determined woman, not so young, and combining her many observations and experiences on the daunting trek through Africa with her recollections of a colourful past in Gloucestershire. For us in Painswick it holds real local interest. It is available in local bookshops – Crossing the Rift by Merilyn Brason.

Twinings, Birds, Cadbury, Ovaltine and Hovis – these were some of the Great British Brands that Philip Wilkinson chose to speak on at the September meeting of Yew Trees WI. All still familiar household names most of these companies were formed in the late eighteen hundreds, several in this area and several by members of The Society of Friends or Quakers. Quakers like all nonconformists were banned from attending English universities so business was a natural outlet for their talents. They used their high moral standards to improve the general living condition of their employees, building houses, schools and infirmaries for their benefit.

Philip explained that many of these names are still familiar because of their unique brand identification and their clever use of slogans. As the saying used to go "Early to bed, early to rise, stick to your work and advertise". His audience nodded with pleasure as they visualised little loaves of Hovis with their name strategically baked on their side, but how many knew that in 1890 a national competition was held to replace the clumsy "Smith's Patent Process Germ Flour" name. A prize of £25 was awarded to the winner for suggesting the name "Hovis" from the Latin "Hominis Vis" meaning "Strength of Man". One feels it was £25 well spent!

## **Touring with the Royals**



At the October meeting of the History Society Alan Pilbeam took members on a veritable royal tour of the most exquisite Tudor houses and hunting grounds in the county. The subject of his presentation was the royal progress through Gloucestershire in 1535, in other words Henry VIII and Anne

Boleyn accompanied by Thomas Cromwell.

Alan began by giving an excellent background picture of the situation explaining that such royal progresses, though common, were usually only about two weeks long but this one lasted from mid-July to the end of October. Accompanying the threesome was an entourage of about 500 people. Henry at this time was beginning to worry – no male heir, financial worries because of war with France and his luxurious lifestyle. Anne was sophisticated and intelligent but unpopular. Cromwell, a hard worker, was constantly seeking sources of taxation from church to Crown ie the monasteries.

With this background information Alan then showed pictures of the various houses and castles where the party stayed and we were certainly stunned. Staying with the abbots in Tewkesbury and then Gloucester, both of which at that time were outstandingly grand, Henry and Anne were able to indulge in their love of hunting because of the private deer parks. Nearer to Painswick they also enjoyed hunting at Prinknash, Miserden and Painswick Lodge courtesy of Sir William Kingston, Painswick's lord of the manor. On to Berkeley Castle, Thornbury Castle, Acton Court and Little Sodbury Manor, all stunningly beautiful architecturally.

Shortly after this procession Henry suffered an accident when a horse fell on him and, as Alan explained, 'he was never quite the same again', Anne had a miscarriage and was later executed and then the monasteries began to close. Monastic treasures and land went to the Crown, were sold on and thus began the emergence of huge private estates.

Members' verdict: this was an excellent presentation both pictorially and verbally. At the next meeting Barry Simon will give a presentation on the history of aviation in Gloucestershire. Croft School, 21st November, 7.30pm. Everyone welcome.

## **Property Report**

Once again a clutch of million pound plus properties are on the market in Painswick, including two of the most imposing houses on New Street. Two doors up New Street, Beaconsfield House has six bedrooms and a surprising amount of garden and parking for a town house (Hamptons, £1.45 million).

More of a country house, Mynd House in the Highlands (Murrays,  $\pm 1.375$  million) has 5 bedrooms, double garage, landscaped gardens and views. Just round the corner, Cotswold View at the Highlands is another substantial six-bedroomed family house (Hamptons,  $\pm 1.275$  million) and Hamptons also have Aries in Hambutts Drive off Edge Road, four bedrooms, extensively modernised and with permission to create a self-contained annexe ( $\pm 1.2$  million).

At what we now have to start thinking about as a more modest price level, Tall Trees in Cotswold Mead is a modern three bedroomed detached family home in a private road (Hamptons, £775,000) and Rose Cottage in Pitchcombe is a three bedroom renovated stone cottage (Murrays, £750,000). Vermont in Cranham, a modern four bedroom semi-detached house has already gone under offer (Murrays, £595,000).

More affordable properties include 1 Prospect Terrace on Tibbiwell, an end of terrace stone cottage, with large garden and parking, but in need of some modernisation (Murrays, £225,000) and 1 Hillview Cottages in Gloucester Street, with some of the same characteristics and unexpectedly re-available (Hamptons, £290,000).

# **Jottings**

Whilst digging my garden the other day I was quite surprised to see so many small insects, worms and other creepy-crawlies.

For instance, comparing centipedes and millipedes. "Mille", a thousand, rather than "centi", millipedes have a lot more legs, four legs per segment rather than two. Though perhaps not as many as a thousand! Millipedes are all hard bodied and are divided into flat ones and snake or pill millipedes. The snake one is long, cylindrical and lives in the soil. It looks like a woodlice and rolls up into a ball when disturbed. The flat ones have flat shields along their backs and like living under logs and stones.

Females can lay from ten to three hundred eggs in their lifetime. Some protect them in the soil with excrement and some make spherical nests. The Snake version is the one you mostly see when you dig the garden, as they stay below the ground. If they get too dry they die. After birth they take about seven moults to reach maturity, taking about six to twelve weeks. They can range from half an inch to two inches long according to their age and they may live from two to five years. The number of segments increases at each moult. They live on decaying plant matter.

There are far larger millipedes in other parts of the world and in some places they are kept as pets.

Centipedes have just two legs per segment and live where it is damp and warm like in gardens and woods. They can live for more than a year, living on small invertebrates and the females lay between fifteen and fifty eggs in their lives.

There seem to have been a lot more woodlice this year, perhaps because it has been wetter and warmer. They have seven body segments each with a pair of legs. They live on fungi, fallen fruit, dead animals and love compost bins. Female woodlice have a pouch like a kangaroo into which they lay between fifteen and fifty eggs. The young hatch inside her, emerging as they become mobile and mature. Woodlice live for three to five years

## A46 Traffic lights to be removed

In response to the Beacon's request for an update this month, Gloucestershire County Council has advised that 'the works are to be complete within the next 2 weeks'. As that was on the 23rd October, it may even have happened by the time you are reading this.

The first stage of the work was carried out at the end of September when an anti-skid surface treatment was applied, with road markings to slow down traffic as it approaches the area from either direction. At the time of writing the update is that they are 'waiting on material/ signage etc. As soon as it arrives the works will be completed and the temporary lights removed'.

The temporary lights were installed around the end of January last year, so have been in place for 21 months. To update our figures from earlier in the year, we estimate that the cumulative delays for motorists over that period have amounted to around 40,000 hours (or over 1500 days) and the cost of wasted fuel in engine idling alone could be around £150,000.
